





FAMILY TREASURES

Family history is something to be treasured! The past helps shape people into who they are today. For this social studies, writing, and oral language project, you will explore the history of your own family. Please create or decorate a "treasure chest" (it can be a box, paper bag, actual treasure box, etc.) to put the following treasures in:

ARTIFACTS:

- 1. A photograph or drawing of your family.
- 2. A photo or drawing of your ancestors. Go back as far as you can: grandparents, great-grandparents, etc.
- 3. A map or drawing of where your ancestors are from.
- 4. A photo or drawing of the flag for the country (or countries) your ancestors are from.
- 5. A list, drawing, or real pictures of foods that are special to your family.
- 6. A photo or drawing of a special family tradition.
- 7. A family artifact. This can be any item (or drawing or photo of an item) that has been been passed down by parents or ancestors.
- 8. Your choice! Choose a treasure that you believe represents your family's history. Ideas: a family tree, lyrics to a special song, a picture from a holiday or event, etc.

Take a video of yourself doing an oral presentation where you tell about each of the treasures in your chest.



Please also answer the following questions in complete sentences. You may type your answers or write with pencil and paper (feel free to use the attached paper if you'd like, and you can illustrate a picture at the top).

QUESTIONS:

- Who are the members of your immediate family? Give a description of each family member.
- 2. Who are some of your ancestors? Tell some interesting facts about your ancestors.
- 3. What are some cultural foods that are special to your family? Tell some details about these foods.
- 4. What are some of your family's special traditions? Provide details about the traditions.
- Why do you think it is important to learn about your family 5. history? What is something new that you learned about your family's past that you did not know before?

Email your writing assignment and record on Flipgrid your oral presentation. For the writing, you can attach your typed document or photos of your written work.




